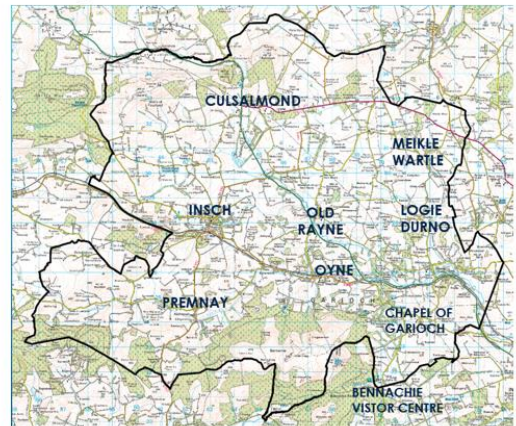

The four main topics we are looking at just now are

1. Insch Hospital and health care within our area. On May 9th the BCC hosted a meeting with Interested parties to talk about the health care in the BCC area as a result of the closure of Insch hospital.
2. Resilience Planning. Work is ongoing at looking at village hall resilience.
3. Community Action Plans and Local Place plans.
4. Developments within the area i.e. Coreen Windfarm.

Local Development Plans and Community Action Plans

We now have set up a meeting with stakeholders to discuss actions coming out of the community action plan. This will happen in early November and we will put more information on Facebook about this. We have been working behind the scenes with some groups to try and get some of the points actioned. Grants have been applied for and thanks to the Friends of Insch Hospital and Community we will have some Christmas lights in Insch. We are applying for a grant to create a local development plan and will be consulting with you soon on that.

Correen Hills Windfarm

This project is moving ahead and as we are here to voice the views of the community, we need to know how you feel about this project. To get your views we have decided to carry out a short survey. This will be carried out by an independent third party.

Bennachie Leisure Centre

As many of you will know, there's been quite a lot of change at Bennachie Leisure Centre recently. This has meant the charity has had to look for new leadership and new team members and so, in August, the board appointed, me, Fiona Heinonen as the charity's new CEO.

I was previously the CEO of another local charity, Kayleigh's Wee Stars, based in Oldmeldrum, a charity supporting families caring for a terminally ill child and founded by parents who had experienced the loss of their 2-year-old daughter Kayleigh to a brain tumour. My job there was to help the charity stabilise post COVID as the pandemic had impacted its funds significantly and it was at risk of closure. The task was to find ways to help them generate their own income to compliment funds from donations and grants,

making them more sustainable and less vulnerable to extreme events in the future. I enjoyed three happy years there and left the charity in a healthier situation and I was delighted to be able to pass on the leadership to the safe hands of one of its founders, Kayleigh's mummy, Anna, knowing they can continue their vital work supporting families facing hardship whilst caring for a terminally ill child.

But I'm delighted to now be part of the team here at BLC – and I'm not the only new face - we have a new chef for the café and some wonderful new community assistants. The team is already working hard to ensure the long-term future of BLC. This may mean more small changes as we progress, with the aim of reducing our running costs and increasing our ability to generate our own funds - to become more self-sustaining, efficient and stable.

In the short term, we cannot do this without the support of our local communities around Bennachie. We are extremely grateful for all that you do for our charity, but we need your support more than ever now. Times are tough for the charitable sector everywhere and Bennachie Leisure Centre is no different, feeling the impact of higher costs, fewer pots of funding and increased competition. But we can overcome these challenges and in the longer term, thrive and continue to serve our communities with our health and wellbeing services, community café, charity shop and community and social activities.

So, currently we need to focus on fundraising to help us meet our short term, immediate financial commitments to allow us to plan for the longer-term future. Our aim is to raise £25,000 in honour of our 25th year of operation in 2025. Anything you can do to help would be amazing and so much appreciated.

For example, we have lots of events coming up and we'd love to have as many of you attend as possible as well as spread the word to friends and family. All the details are on our Facebook page or available at BLC itself. We've also got our gym and fitness classes memberships which help us to generate our own income – and the gym is newly refurbished with new equipment arriving soon too. If we had just 50 new monthly members, we would be well on the way to ensuring the longer-term future of the centre. Or, you could simply visit the community café and sample some of the new and old items on the menu. The café also now stocks Stonyfield Free Range Eggs from

Drumblade, Fernlea Honey from Kennethmont and Bennachie Coffee from Banchory.

And lastly, pop along to our charity shop, have a browse and buy some of the clothes, toys or household items available. Our aim is to offer our stock at affordable prices for all and in particular for those living on lower incomes and to divert items from landfill and promote the repurposing of pre-loved goods. Our volunteers work so hard in the shop, sorting all the donations and keeping the shop going and I know they'd value your support too.

I know the Bennachie communities have done much over the years to support BLC, but we would be very grateful for your support again in the short term to help us become more self-sustaining and stable going forward so that we may not have to do campaigns like this in the future.

Please be reassured that we're working hard on making applications to other sources of funding too, but anything that you, our community can do to help would make a crucial difference to our future and would be very, very much appreciated. Our small team works incredibly hard to keep the doors open and we want to do all we can to serve you and offer you the facilities you'd like to see here.

Please do come along to meet me and the team and we'll be more than happy to chat and answer any questions you might have. It would be great to get to know as many of you as we can. And lastly, thank you for all your support from all of us at Bennachie Leisure Centre Charity

INSCH MEADOWS It's that time of year to cut the Meadows and lift the cuttings from the wildflowers. This happens every year and has done since 2009. Even though this is a wildflower meadow with native wildflowers found in our area it still needs to be managed like any garden/field. The reason we cut it is to ensure that the flowers don't die back and enrich the soil with organic matter which is detrimental to the wildflowers which tend to thrive in impoverished soils. It also helps reduce some of the plants taking over. This is how any wildflower meadow is managed and is essential for the continuation of the Meadow.

We cut the Meadow just now as most of the plants will have flowered and their seeds will have been dispersed. If we wait until October the weather changes and as this is a natural flood plain area the soil gets too wet and the machinery used to cut the Meadow churns up the soil causing damage. The area around the pond and surrounding the Meadow is left uncut for insects/frogs/toads to overwinter.

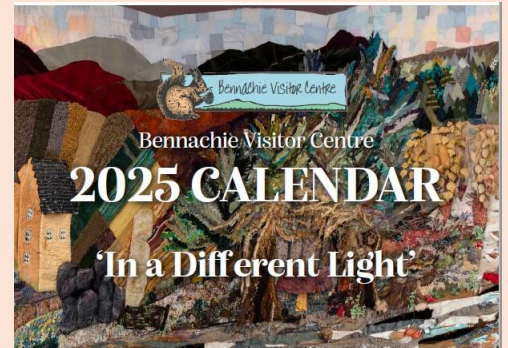
We are also cutting back the Willow trees next to the path which were hanging over it. These will be coppiced which means that you will see a big change in the trees as they are cut back. This will keep the willows back from the path and allow clear access for folks with buggies etc. The brush from the coppiced willow is going to be left in small habitat piles within the woodland and will rot down over time. Willow coppices really well and it will quickly re-grow from the cut sections. We waited to do this now rather than through the summer as the birds will have finished nesting. The other trees in The Meadows are not being cut back which will leave cover for birds during the winter.

We would be grateful if you could please use other paths while the work is going on.

they finally settled on a piece by one of our Primary 4 pupils, Lewis Murray. His piece "Colourful Skies" can be found on November. We are really delighted to see the finished calendar and we are proud to have been part of that process."



The calendar has been produced to commemorate the 30th anniversary of the Bennachie Visitor Centre in 2025. 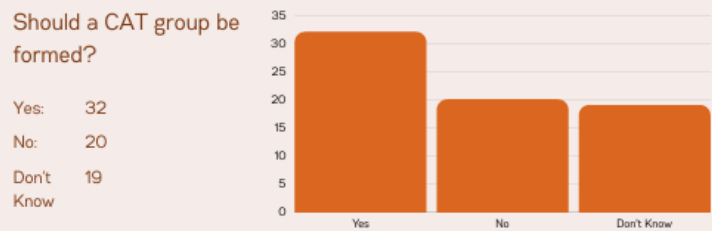
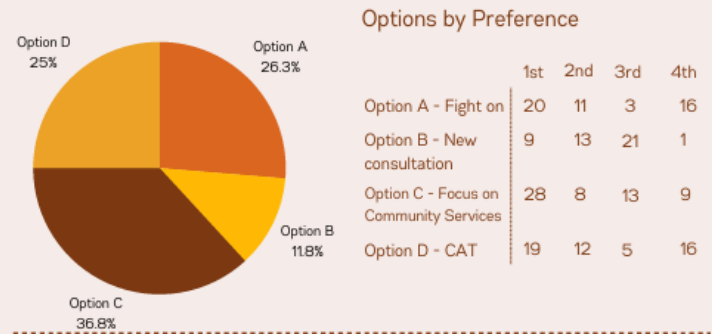
Moving Forward: Community Engagement and CAT Exploration

Those who attended our public meeting in May will know that we distributed a survey to determine the way forward for us, as a group. This survey was shared both online and throughout the community during May and June. While we received a reasonable response—76 forms returned—it didn’t provide us with a strong enough mandate to make a firm decision. See the results on the opposite side of the page.

Following this, we made the decision to form a group with those who expressed interest in exploring a Community Asset Transfer (CAT) for Insch Hospital. The

group has now met, and although potential services and a layout plan was discussed for the existing building, it was agreed that, initially, we would write to the Aberdeenshire Health and Social Care Partnership (AHSCP) and local councillors to update them on the consultation efforts made by the Friends since the interested parties meeting on 9 May 2024. At the IJB meeting on 1 June 2022, it was recommended that further development and consultation on health and social care services in the community be carried out by AHSCP. Sadly, two years later, it’s clear no progress has been made by the Partnership on this front.

The Friends, however, have taken action. We held a public meeting on 18 May 2024, distributed feedback forms about service provision in Insch, and collected further input during the Strawberry Fair. We believe these efforts should be considered as part of a broader consultation on the community’s needs.

We are eager to meet with the Partnership to discuss how we can work together to address the needs identified through our consultations this year. While the group acknowledged that it’s too early to draft a formal report on which services could be provided in

Phase 1 of the current building, we are keen to explore the possibilities. Concern was raised about pursuing a CAT, given the level of commitment and resources it would require, and we are keen to collaborate with the Partnership to explore all options moving forward.

Maud Resource Centre

In the meantime, on Friday 13th September, we were invited to the Maud Resource Centre for a presentation by the Manager on their facility, what it offers and how it is funded. This proved an interesting visit, particularly regarding the staffing and how this is funded. This is another item we would like to discuss further with NHS Grampian and AHSCP executives. A meeting has been requested.

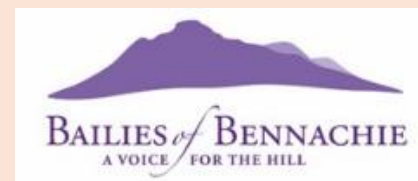

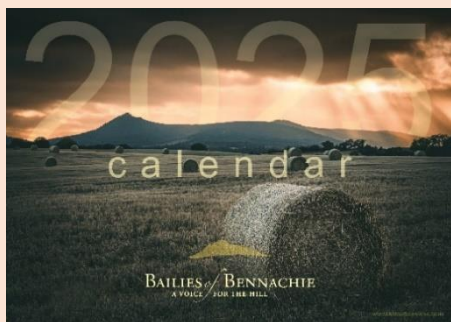

CHAPEL OF GARIOCH VILLAGE HALL

Chapel of Garioch Village Hall has been successful in its bid to the UK Shared Prosperity Fund and Vattenfall to install wall insulation and solar panels. The bid also includes 2 batteries to store the energy generated by the solar panels. The hall was built in the 1930s and is therefore dated and not energy efficient. This renovation will help the hall on its journey to becoming net zero. The hall is at the centre of a scattered rural community and is well used by a variety of local groups and for events such as plant sales, coffee mornings and parties.

The work will include installation of a generator funded by SSEN as the hall will be a resilience hub for the community.

The work will take place in September and early October which means that the Pop Up Pub date will be moved from the 4 October to 29 November. The Bay Fish and Chip van will be open on the 29th November from 5pm onwards and the pub will run from 7 till 11pm.

The hall will also be the venue for a Hogmanay Ceilidh with the band Iron Broo this year. Tickets have been in great demand and the event is already sold out.

RESILIENCE – ARE YOU PREPARED?

Personal Resilience

When severe weather or a local crisis occurs, we can rely on the emergency services and their partners to do everything they can to support our communities. But how can we make sure that we're ready to react should we be affected by severe weather, or a household emergency where we need to act quickly? This is what we call 'personal resilience' and thankfully there's a wide range of advice and information that can help you ensure you are ready to deal with unforeseen challenges.

One of the simplest ways to check your personal resilience is by downloading the 30 days in 30 ways checklist <https://www.aberdeenshire.gov.uk/.../be-more-resilient-in...> From knowing where your stopcock is to having a torch to hand in case of power loss, the checklist can be followed day by day or at any time during the year.

If you want to explore your preparedness a bit further, you can download an emergency household plan template <https://www.aberdeenshire.gov.uk/.../emergency-household...> where you can keep a note of important contacts, how to turn your power, gas, and water on and off, and the steps you would take if you need to leave home in a hurry.

You'll always find the latest guidance for individuals, communities and businesses on the Ready Aberdeenshire webpages <https://www.aberdeenshire.gov.uk/.../ready-aberdeenshire/> The site contains clear information around how to plan for an emergency, along with contact details for a range of organisations should an emergency occur.

At a Scotland-wide level, Ready Scotland <https://ready.scot/> opens in a new tab hosts a range of advice around emergencies in Scotland. The website provides guidance around how to prepare for an emergency, how to respond during an emergency, and how to get involved in helping your community become more resilient.

And for a national perspective, the UK Government's Prepare website <https://prepare.campaign.gov.uk/>

opens in a new tab provides information on a wide range of hazards that could affect the country, from storms to flooding right up to infectious disease outbreaks. The site contains advice specific to each of the four nations.

Whether it's a quick check of the essentials, or an opportunity to develop a household emergency plan, spending just a few minutes to check your personal resilience could make all the difference should a crisis occur.

As well as considering your own circumstances, please also think of friends and neighbours who may benefit from the advice and information, particularly if they have limited or no access to the internet.

Vulnerable People

The emergency services and their partners support people of all ages and abilities when an incident happens, but for those who require extra support several additional services are available.

If you – or a friend or relative – may benefit from some extra support during a crisis, here are some resources that you may find helpful.

Age Scotland has produced the Building Resilience: Preparing for emergencies and beyond booklet, which is free to download <https://www.aberdeenshire.gov.uk/.../age-scotland...>

Aimed at those aged 50 and older, the booklet provides a range of information around preparing for emergencies, organising your paperwork, helping with finances, and reducing risk at home.

It also provides guidance on social connection for wellbeing, caring for your health, and planning for the future.

For immediate support when an issue arises, the Priority Services Register <https://psrscotland.com/> is a free, UK-wide service which provides extra help during power cuts or when there's an interruption to your electricity, gas or water supply.

The service is open to a wide range of people, including everybody over 60, those who use medical equipment reliant on electricity or water, and people with a disability.

This includes people who are blind or partially sighted, deaf or hard of hearing, or who have chronic illness. The register is also open to those with children under five, and people with a mental health condition. To find out more, and to register, visit <https://psrscotland.com/>

And it's never too early to learn how to react when an emergency happens. For younger residents, the free 'Let's Get Ready for an Emergency!' children's activity book can be downloaded and viewed on screen, with individual pages printed out if desired.

Weather warnings and flooding

While Aberdeenshire is known for its natural beauty and is a haven for tourists in the warmer months, residents know that weather in the north-east can be tough at times. When bad weather is forecast many of us will hear it mentioned on the radio or television

news, but what other steps can we take to react quickly before or during severe weather?

The Met Office provides up to date information on [weather warnings across the UK](#) and provides details of the type, expected severity, and expected duration of bad weather. It is worth bookmarking the site on your computer, laptop, or smartphone and checking for updates during bad weather.

And when bad weather leads to localised power cuts, [SSEN's Power Track service opens in a new tab](#) provides live updates on planned and unplanned power outages, as well as showing when engineers are onsite to resolve an issue. You can also report a power cut via the site, or by calling 105. It's another good site to bookmark.

SSEN also has advice on [what to do during a power cut opens in a new tab](#), including steps to take when the power goes out, along with free downloadable resources.

When it comes to flooding, another excellent resource is [SEPA's Floodline service opens in a new tab](#). As well as providing live updates on flood alerts, flood warnings, and severe flood warnings, the site allows visits to report flooding incidents, and provides guidance on checking your flood risk. You can sign up for flood alerts, and can call the Floodline on 0345 988 1188.

Looking to take steps to protect your property from flooding? Aberdeenshire Council has information about various [flood protection products](#), such as flood gates and vent guards, that can be purchased at cost price.

It is worth noting down who to contact when flooding occurs, with details available on the [Aberdeenshire Council website](#).

If you're not sure where to start when it comes to preparing for flooding, the [Scottish Flood Forum opens in a new tab](#) has excellent advice and resources to help you plan ahead. From preparing an emergency flood kit to protecting your property, you'll also find video clips from Aberdeenshire residents who have been affected by flooding.

As we head towards the colder months, please consider taking time to explore the steps you could take to make dealing with bad weather, power loss, or flooding that little bit more manageable.



The A2B bus service is a council operated minibus service providing travel for shopping or other local services or
